POLITICAL AND SOCIAL USE OF MATERIAL AND ARTISTIC PRODUCTION

(20 HOURS)

Lectures focus on material and art production from Antiquity to Contemporary Age, contextualized within their social practice and political role. The aim of the course is to diachronically inspect the complex theoretical framework of material culture and artistic creation, considering it through the shaping and transformation of social and political relations as prominent aspects in their practice. Special attention is given to continuity and discontinuity in different contexts of material culture, art forms, ages, and geographical areas.

SEMINARI

ART COLLECTING: EXHIBITION, CONSERVATION AND ATTRIBUTION HISTORY

The workshop proposes some paths in the history of collecting ancient and contemporary art, through a variety of approaches ranging from the analysis of the phenomena of formation and dispersion of ancient and contemporary art collections, to an in-depth study of the methods of scholars involved in connoisseurship, up to the history of taste.

ARCHEOLOGY, SETTLEMENTS AND TERRITORIAL ANALYSIS

The workshop aims to address the study of the relationship between ancient communities and their territorial context. Starting from the most recent debate on the processes that determine the birth and development of the settlements, the seminar program intends to provide students with the tools of analysis, historical, economic, social, political and cultural reconstruction essential to propose a methodologically correct reading of the investigated contexts. The chronological range extends from the prehistoric age to the late-antiquity. Such studies will be carried out through different theoretical approaches and methodologies, through the use of new technologies, applied both to on field research projects (archaeological excavations, surveys, etc.) both to laboratory in depth analyses.

PROJECT PROPOSAL DEVELOPMENT TRAINING

Workshop on EU Funding opportunities focusing on innovative concepts that can have an impact on archaeology and art-historical research. The seminar is designed to address the specific needs, constraints, and culture to design, write and submit successful projects called by EU Institutions and it will be organized with scholars who were awarded ERC grants for projects in the Humanities, as well as by expert evaluators of international projects. Students will have the opportunity to simulate projects based on their research.

NEW APPROACHES TO ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND ART HISTORICAL RESEARCH

The aim of this workshop is to propose a series of reflections and insights into new interdisciplinary research approaches in archaeology and art history, with the participation of scholars of international reputation.
